

Visiting your local fire station can help you learn safety tips that can help keep you and your family safe. Firefighters will be happy to help teach you important fire safety rules.



It is important to place smoke detectors on every floor of your home, especially in or near bedrooms. Firefighters can help you decide the best location to have smoke detectors installed in your home. Make certain to test and change batteries at least once a year. Do not stay in a house or building if it is on fire.



Knowing how to call for help in case of an emergency is very important. Clearly speak your name, address and phone number. Practice with your family how to call for help if needed.

Never play with matches. If you see another child playing with matches or a lighter, tell an adult immediately.



It is a good idea to have at least one fire extinguisher in your home, located in an easy to reach location. Have everyone in your family learn how to use the fire extinguisher. Have the fire extinguishers tested once a year to make certain they are in proper working order.

If you are in a building that is on fire and you are inside a closed room, feel the door BEFORE you open it to see if it is hot. This will let you know if the fire is on the other side.




Breathing smoke can be very dangerous! Heat rises, so there will be more smoke higher in the room. Try to stay low. Crawl on your hands and knees as quickly as possible to the nearest exit away from the fire. Remember to get out and stay out.




When you enter a public building look around so you will know where the exits are located. Know which ones are closest. If you are in a burning building never use the elevator, always use the stairs to escape. Be sure to check the door for heat before opening. Check for smoke in the stairwell and quickly exit the building.


STOP If your clothing should catch on fire do not run. Remember to STOP, DROP and ROLL. **DROP ROLL**

If your clothing should catch on fire do not run. Remember to **STOP, DROP, and ROLL**. This will help put the fire out. If the sleeves of your clothes are not on fire, use your arms to cover and protect your face.

Special flashing lights and sirens alert people that a fire truck is on its way to an emergency and warns them to get out of the way.



If you are riding in an automobile and see a fire truck with flashing lights, tell the driver to pull over along the side of the road immediately.



Firefighters use ladder trucks to reach windows and rooftops of tall buildings allowing them to rescue people who are trapped inside or cannot reach safe ground. Some ladder trucks can reach as high as 100 feet!



You and your family should practice what you have learned about fire safety. Make a plan as a family on what you would do in case there was a fire in your home. Check your smoke detectors and fire extinguishers to see that they are working and you know where they are in case of an emergency.
